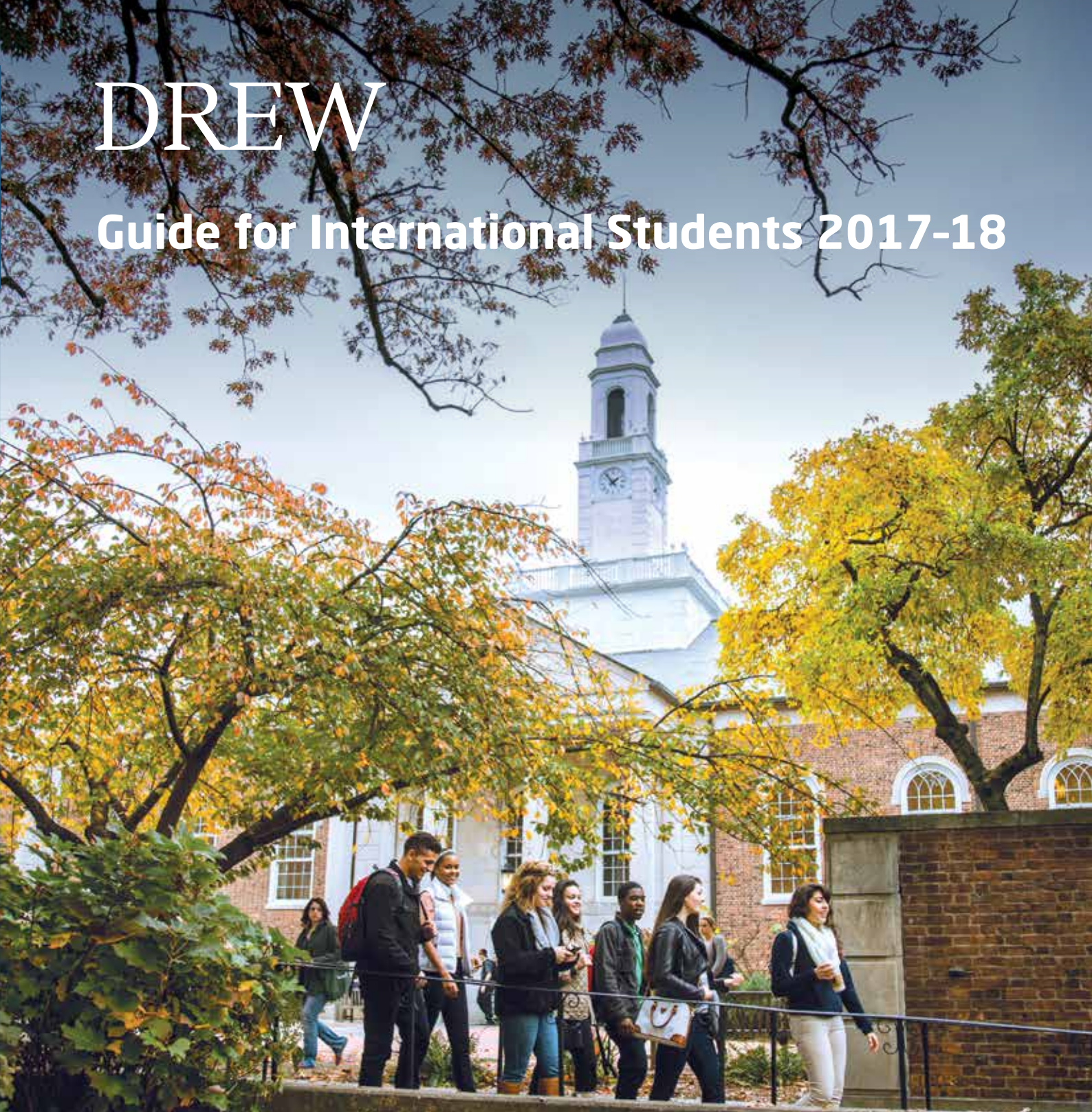

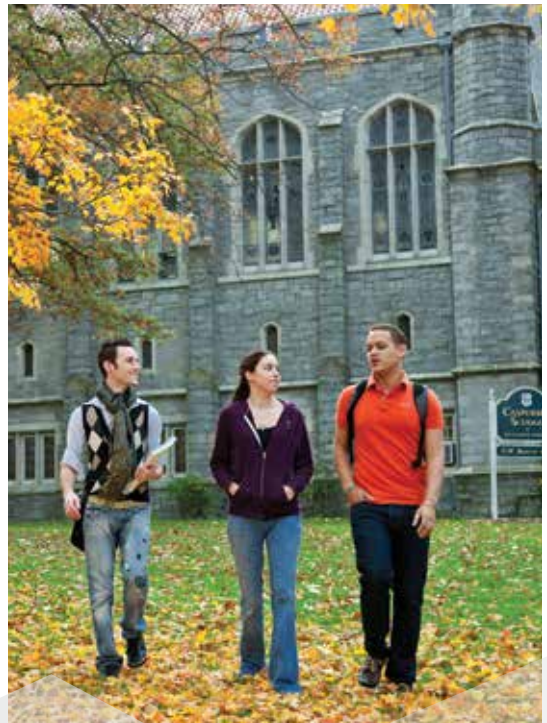

Semesters in New York City

Our New York Semesters are your ticket into some of the city's most high-powered spaces. You earn academic credit and make connections—at the United Nations, on Wall Street, in the world of contemporary art and the media capital of the world.

Semester on Wall Street

During this semester we take you to the center of the global financial markets. Visit companies and meet with executives who play major roles in shaping the world's economy while learning how they accomplish their work. In the last five years, students who participated in the Wall Street Semester have gone to work for firms like BNY Mellon, JP Morgan, Goldman Sachs and Tesla. Once you finish the program, you will have a strong understanding of how markets work and where your place in it may be once you graduate. In this semester you will visit:

- Investment firms including Goldman Sachs, BNY Mellon, JP Morgan and Merrill Lynch
- Hedge funds like Spring Mountain Capital and BlackRock Advisors
- Stock Exchanges like NASDAQ and the New York Stock Exchange
- Regulatory agencies including the US Securities and Exchange Commission

Semester at the United Nations

Spend time on the ground floor of global politics. Interview diplomats, learn about the inner workings of the UN and discuss the issues reshaping the international community on a daily basis. Drew's status as a non-governmental organization offers you unparalleled access. In this semester you will visit:

- International ambassadors and delegates
- Non-governmental organizations like the Red Cross, Human Rights Watch and World Vision

Semester on Contemporary Art

Get involved in the New York contemporary art scene for an entire semester. One day, you're sitting in an up-and-coming artist's Brooklyn studio, discussing how nature inspires you. The next, you're at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, debating political meaning of a Kandinsky work. While this program is required for all art and art history majors, it's open to all Drew students. In this semester you will visit:

- Artist studios
- Curators and gallery owners
- Art dealers and brokers

Semester on Communications and Media

New York City is the media and communications capital of the world. We take you to learn from professionals who shape our interconnected world. From TriBeCa to the Upper East Side neighborhoods, firms both big and small come up with creative ways to provide ideas, information and stories that shape our culture. These messages help create identities and personalities for their companies, organizations and products. In this semester you will visit:

- Advertising agencies
- Broadcast companies like CBS, ABC and NBC
- Publishing firms
- Print media outlets like *The New York Times* and *Time Magazine*

Semester on Social Entrepreneurship

You will visit foundations, government offices and non-profit organizations to examine their role in addressing social problems, such as inequality, poverty, conflict, environmental damage and rights abuses and work with a non-profit partner to address a challenge that institution is facing.

New York Theatre Program

This year-long program partners you with a professional theatre company that will help you create an original performance to premiere in New York City. You'll attend Broadway and Off-Broadway shows and conduct research and work with professional mentors to develop an original theatre piece. Open to majors and minors in the theatre and dance department.

Science Opportunities at Drew

One of the most important things for science majors is research. With no graduate students in science disciplines, Drew offers unparalleled research opportunities for our undergraduates.

RISE Program

New Jersey is the home of major drug development laboratories and AT&T's research division. The Charles A. Dana Research Institute for Scientists Emeriti offers undergraduates the unique opportunity to engage in research under the supervision of retired industrial scientists. Working with RISE Fellows puts you in the lab with the professional scientific community while still an undergraduate, an experience typically reserved for postgraduates.

RISE also gives you experience with analytic equipment you'll use on the job, from liquid chromatography and cyclotrons to high-field nuclear magnetic resonance spectrometry.

RISE is unique: no other school has such a program.

Research with Nobel Prize Winner

RISE Fellow Associate Dr. William Campbell received the 2015 Nobel Prize in Medicine for discovering a drug that treats parasitic diseases. Campbell has taught as a RISE Fellow for 20 years.

Pre-Med, Your Path to Medical School

By leveraging a strong background in liberal arts with an emphasis on science, social science and humanities courses, we provide you with unmatched opportunities for research and clinical internships that are essential for admission to medical school.

Pre-med students receive custom support, including advising from both an academic advisor who is a professor in your chosen major and a pre-med advisor who is a member of the National Association of Advisors for Health Professions.

Research with Faculty

Interested in something your professor is researching? Just ask, and a world of possibilities will open. Drew faculty conduct research on a wide range of important issues, including bacterial pathogenesis, evolution in polluted lakes, primate communication, the molecular biology of cancer, international health care, forest integrity, physiology, Alzheimer's disease, HIV/AIDS and more.

Drew Summer Science Institute

The DSSI pairs you with faculty mentors for an intensive, personal experience working full time on a research project. Each summer, approximately 15 students participate in this six-week program, which provides opportunities to pursue real-world scientific questions and establish professional relationships with faculty at research universities and local industries. Each student receives on-campus housing, a budget for laboratory supplies and a weekly stipend throughout the duration of the program.

Morristown Medical Center

Our mentor program with nearby Morristown Medical Center is a work-study semester that allows you to shadow emergency room physicians. You will witness first-hand what it takes to be a doctor and gain valuable experience before applying to a medical program.

INTO Drew University is your first step toward academic success in the US. Our innovative Pathway and English language programs, outstanding faculty, facilities and support services ease your transition to US life and prepare you for the demands of a rigorous undergraduate education.

In addition to university resources, INTO Drew University delivers a wide range of personalized services to ensure you are safe, supported and successful in your academic and personal goals.

One-on-one Coaching

You will meet with a member of our Student Services team during your first week of classes to set your academic goals for the semester. From time management and organization skills to test preparation techniques, our academic coaches work with you on an ongoing basis to develop individualized methods to maximize your success.

Family Friendship Program

This opt-in program for Pathway and direct admit students gives our international students the unique opportunity to build friendships and experience cultural exchange with a local family. Families meet with their international student several times each semester to share meals, holiday celebrations and the experience of American family life in Madison and the surrounding area.

Conversation Partners

This 10-week program helps students develop cross-cultural awareness by exchanging ideas, stories and traditions with honor students from a different background in an informal setting. One-on-one and small group conversations are available for all INTO students.

International Ambassador Peer Mentor Program

International Ambassadors are current domestic and international students who use their own experiences to guide first year international students at Drew. These ambassadors remain peer mentors for our Pathway and Academic English students throughout the year.

LAUNCH into a Successful Career

Through our LAUNCH program, you will develop a strong portfolio of job skills that will help you acquire internships and work opportunities after graduation. Learn to write a strong resume, build a professional network and get help securing valuable experience through internships.

Baldwin Honors Tutoring Program

Pathway students pair with a dedicated tutor from the Drew Baldwin Honors program whom they meet regularly throughout the semester. Tutoring focuses on building language skills through academic course content and navigating American academic culture.

On-campus Jobs

INTO Drew offers part-time positions to help you develop necessary skills to be successful in the workplace, bolster your résumé and earn some extra spending money.

Chinese Language and Cultural Advisor

Our CLCA plays a pivotal role in supporting students from mainland China, Hong Kong and Taiwan. Undergraduate Admissions

Students can choose from more than 50 academic programs to study. Drew offers three different ways for international students to earn their bachelor's degree: direct entry, Pathway programs and English language programs.

Direct Entry

Drew offers direct admission to international students who have completed a high school diploma and have strong English language comprehension. If you do not meet these requirements, we encourage you to apply to our Pathway or Academic English programs. Full entry requirements are on page 21.

Pathway Programs

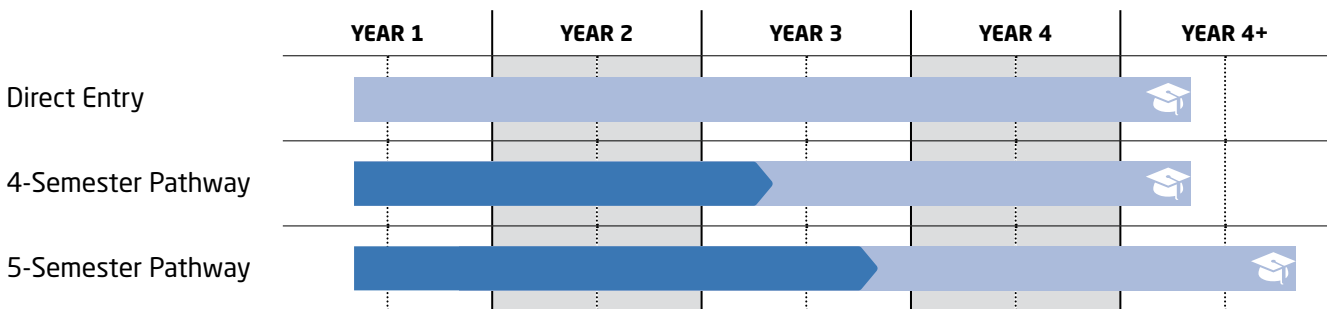
Sample Program Length

Applying for admission is easy. You can even apply online. Once we have received your application, application fee and all required admission credentials, your file will be reviewed and you will receive notification of our admission decision.

How to Apply

- Review direct entry requirements (right column) to be sure you meet academic and English language requirements.
- Apply online: drew.edu/apply
- Upload transcripts from all secondary and post-secondary institutions attended.
- Test scores must be received directly from the official testing source and verified.
- Documents issued in languages other than English must be accompanied by a certified English translation.
- Submit a copy of your passport.

Credit-by-Exam

Drew recognizes the achievement of AP, IB and A Level scholars. Students may be eligible for advanced academic standing and scholarships and can receive transfer credits from the exams, courses or subjects taken.

Transfer Requirements

Academic Entry Requirements:

- Up to 80 transferable credits, with grades of C- or better on a 4.0 GPA scale with a minimum 2.5 GPA required for consideration for admission.
- Transferable course work **MUST** be comparable to courses offered at Drew University.
- Credit is not granted for basic skills or remedial course work.

Admissions decisions are holistic, considering both college GPA, and for students with less than 24 credits, may also consider high school grades.

English Language Requirements:

- TOEFL iBT 80 (18 minimum subscores)
- IELTS 6.5 (6.0 minimum subscores)

Housing Requirements

- All undergraduate students are expected to live in university housing for the first two years.

Pathway Programs

Understand the Pathway Program

INTO Drew's International Year One Undergraduate Pathway program combines intensive language study, academic skills development and credit-bearing course work in an individualized program designed to move students successfully through the first two years of their four-year degree program in the US.

After successfully completing either the 4-Semester or 5-Semester Pathway program and meeting all entry requirements, students may progress to Drew. Pathway programs begin in both the fall and spring semesters. Some programs may require taking additional courses in the summer semester in order to complete the degree in four years.

Decide if the Program is Right for You

The Pathway program is for students who:

- Want to study for an undergraduate degree in the US
- Desire additional academic, language and cultural support in order to succeed during their first two years at a US university
- May need to improve English language skills
- May have lower GPAs than required of direct-entry students

Fully Integrated University Experience

Drew Pathway students take academic courses that count for their intended majors and other courses required for all students for graduation. The curriculum is customized based on students' curricular plans and skill level.

Program Benefits

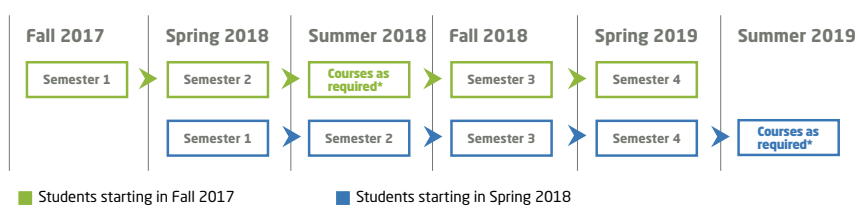

Study Abroad with English

Program Description

Study Abroad with English combines English for Academic Purposes with the chance to experience undergraduate courses at Drew University. This program allows students to earn college credits in their field of interest without having to enroll in a long-term degree program. The program can be customized for specific academic interests.

With prior approval from a student's home university, the academic courses studied at Drew can earn credits toward an undergraduate degree in his or her home country. Earned credits also may be applied to a degree program with admission to Drew.

Program Structure

Students will take English for Academic Purposes courses for eight credit hours and two additional academic courses for an additional eight credit hours. SAWE runs for a minimum of one semester and a maximum of one academic year.

Students will study individually selected undergraduate courses at Drew alongside US and other international students and can select courses from a wide variety of subjects in consultation with their academic advisors.

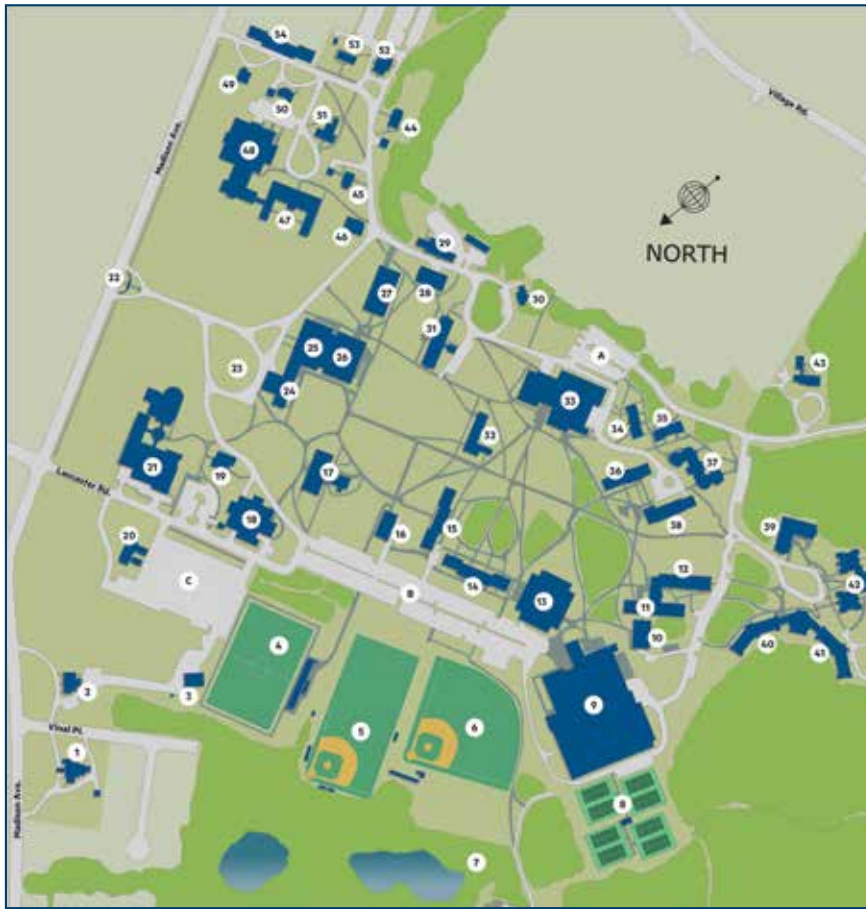

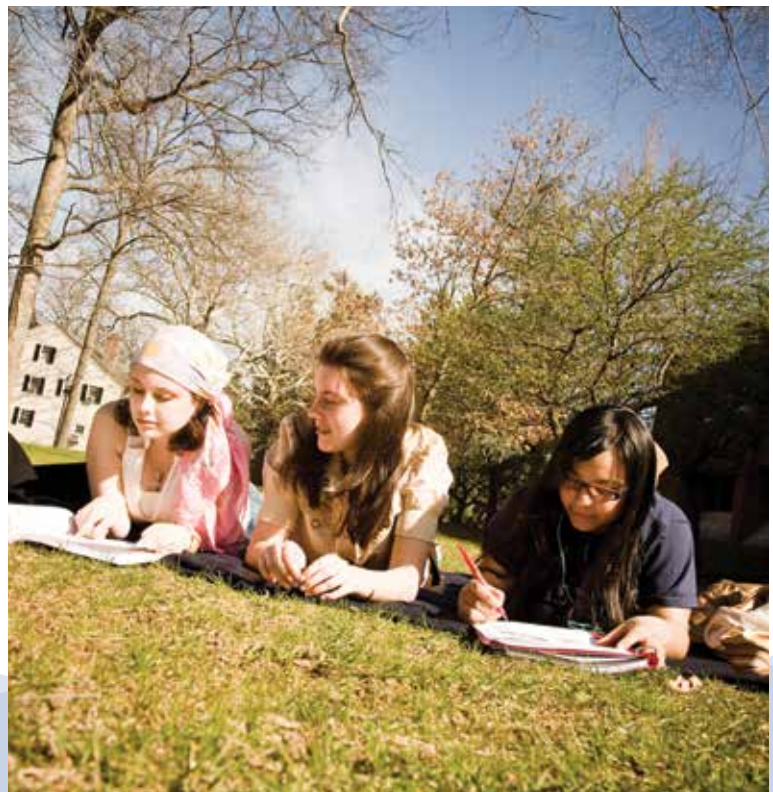

Simon Forum and Athletic Center

Work and Internships

Drew Summer Science Institute

The DSSI pairs you with faculty mentors for an intensive, personal experience working full time on a research project. Each summer, approximately 15 students participate in this six-week program, which provides opportunities to pursue real-world scientific questions and establish professional relationships with faculty at research universities and local industries. Each student receives on-campus housing, a budget for laboratory supplies and a weekly stipend throughout the duration of the program.

Morristown Medical Center

Our mentor program with nearby Morristown Medical Center is a work-study semester that allows students to shadow emergency room physicians. You will witness first-hand what it takes to be a doctor and gain valuable experience before applying to a medical program.

Working after Graduation

Depending on your visa, you may be eligible for Optional Practical Training or Academic Training. International students on F-1 visas are eligible to apply to US Immigration for one year of work authorization within their field of study. Students in STEM fields can apply for up to an additional 24-month extension of work authorization with qualified employers after their initial 12-month OPT period, allowing you to work in the US for up to three years on your F-1 student visa. J-1 students may apply for a period of Academic Training related to their program of study to take advantage of employment opportunities after graduation.

Students who earn INTO Drew scholarships for their Pathway program will be eligible to keep those scholarships for the remaining four semesters of study at Drew, providing they make satisfactory academic progress (2.0 GPA).

If a student's INTO Drew scholarship is less than the Drew or Dean's scholarships, the student's INTO Drew scholarship can be replaced by the greater award. Students may receive only one type of scholarship but not both (either a INTO Drew or Dean's/ Drew Scholarship).

Pathway students not receiving an INTO Drew scholarship upon entrance will be eligible for a Dean's or Drew Scholarship with a 3.25 GPA or greater in the Pathway program.
